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Hubbard Landfill Will Affect Shenango River

Hubbard Township is the site of the latest battle to protect the Shenango river. You may have heard that the citizens are organizing to fight a proposed construction landfill to be located on Drummond Road in Hubbard township. But have you heard of how this will affect the Shenango River?

The landfill will be located on an area that includes wetlands and drains into Little Yankee Run Creek, which flows into the Shenango River. This creek flows through Hubbard, then crosses into PA at West Middlesex.

The landfill is supposedly safe, because it will be for "construction debris". What they are not saying is that this type of landfill can include household refuse to certain limits. Also, we should consider what is in construction debris: Lead paint and other materials from demolition, arsenic, formaldehyde, and various chemicals used in new materials. Drywall in itself is very dangerous to the environment when it gets wet, producing sulphur compounds. These chemicals will all be added to the river.

At this time, the company has submitted an application for a landfill permit to the Trumbull County Health Dept. A decision is expected August 18th. If approved, there would be a request for a zoning change in Hubbard Township.

We all have to think of this as our battle. This will not just hurt "other people". To help with this fight, the citizens have organized a non-profit organization. Hubbard Environmental @Land Preservation (H.E.L.P.), has hired an environmental attorney and an environmental engineer. This is one of the most important steps that can be taken, but it is not cheap. If you would like to help H.E.L.P., you can contact them at 330-360-9449, or send donations to P.O. Box 14, Hubbard, Ohio 44425.

But there is more that you can do. Write to the Trumbull County Board of health, Attn.: Frank Migliozi, 176 Chestnut Ave. NE, Warren, Ohio 44483 to express your concerns. Also write to the Hubbard Township Trustees, Attn.: Jonathan Dowell, Chairman; 2600 Elmwood Dr., Hubbard, Ohio 44425 to ask them to vote NO on a zoning change if it comes to them. Watch for notices of public meetings and make time to attend. Decisions are often made based on the number of people in attendance at meetings and the volume of mail on a subject.

You can also write or call the PA Dept. of Environmental Protection (DEP), Attn.: Ricardo Gilson, 230 Chestnut Street, Meadville, PA 16335-3481, phone 814-332-6942, to encourage them to act on our behalf. They also have some clout in regard to water that will flow directly into Pennsylvania.

We have to care now. Action today could put a stop to problems in the future.

Hermitage School District Gets Involved

The Hermitage School District received a second Growing Greener Grant to fund the Pine Hollow Run Tributary Stream Restoration Project. The first grant funded the design of the project. The second grant includes the permitting, construction and also planting of a riparian zone. Restoration of the stream that runs behind the school will enhance the water quality throughout the watershed, especially in Pine Hollow Run and ultimately in the Shenango River. Currently, there are very steep, undercut banks and deep, sediment-laden pools along the reach of stream that flows behind the schools, contributing to sediment problems downstream. Restoring the stream to a natural, stable condition will maintain a more natural flow and eliminate the amount of sediment loading into Pine Hollow Run.



Wallace and Pancher, Inc., a local consulting firm that specializes in Natural Stream Channel Design, has been contracted to obtain the environmental permits, design the stream restoration, and is the general contractor for the project. They have been involved in other projects working with students from the Hermitage School District, including planting a wetland at a nearby wetland migration for a development, stream quality monitoring with QUEST students and environmental biology classes. Several more stream and wetland projects are in the planning and design phase that will offer the continued opportunity for our students to learn and participate in the restoration of our local environment.

The theme for the Earth Week celebration for the Hermitage Elementary School this year was "S.O.S.: Save Our Streams And Wetlands". Students represented different plants and animals from the streams and wetlands at the Earth Fest on Friday, April 23rd as they sang songs, made Greed pledges, saw skits and videos and later planted a tree on the school nature trail. Dan Wallace of Wallace & Pancher, Inc. gave a short presentation to 400 3rd and 4th graders describing the stream restoration project.

The Earth Week activities served as a kickoff for the S.O.S. Project. Students from each of three buildings (K-6) will adopt the section of stream that flows behind the respective building. This month they worked with members of the Green Team (High School Environmental Club), PTO, Shenango River watchers, Boys Scouts, DEP, Girl Scouts and other volunteers to plant the riparian zone, including 1200 to 1500 trees and shrubs, 2000 live plant cuttings, and special seed mix formulated for floodplain areas.

The school nature trail will eventually connect with the stream study area. Students will continue to conduct biannual stream quality monitoring, including macro-invertebrate inventories, chemical testing, and measuring physical characteristics.


The Trumbull County Soil and Water Conservation District will be visiting the site as part of their summer tour on July 27, 2004.

Birding New For Shenango

Most bird watchers first come to Shenango Lake to view the shorebirds feeding on the mudflats when the water of the lake has been lowered in late summer. But year round birding is also rewarding as the habitat surrounding the lake and the river supports a host of birds. During the spring and fall migration and throughout the summer, the wood warblers, known as the “jewels” of the bird kingdom because of their brightly colored feathers, can be seen and heard if one knows where to look and listen. These Neotropical migrants that winter in the south and return northward each spring for the breeding season are anxiously anticipated almost as much as the spring wildflowers that are beginning to bloom just as the earliest warblers appear. One of the first to return to nest is the Louisiana Waterthrush which chooses a home close to the rushing waters of the river’s edge. The Yellow Warbler soon follows and we can hear his “sweet sweet” song as he sings from the willows around the lake. Others come in waves with the weather - some to pass further northward and some to call Shenango home for the summer season. The Blue-winged Warbler and the Chestnut-sided Warbler can be found in the Golden Run access area. The riparian habitat along the river also offers a place for many others including my personal favorite - the beautifully colored Cerulean Warbler. You can tell by its name that it must be blue and indeed the male is colored with a beautiful blue. This insectivore forages and nests high in the canopy and even if you know its song, you are still lucky to locate it in the lofty branches of the trees along the river. The Cerulean Warbler is also one of the land birds for conservation

in the United States and is listed as a species of concern in Pennsylvania. To protect this bird, the diverse canopy habitat along the river must be maintained. A complete listing of the warblers of Shenango is included in the bird checklist compiled by the Bartramian Audubon Society of Slippery Rock.



2nd Pennsylvania Breeding Bird Atlas

Starting in January of 2004, Pennsylvania began its 2nd Breeding Bird Atlas. For the next 5 years, birders out in the field are asked to watch and keep track of the nesting of all species encountered. As in the last atlas, the working unit will be approximately 10 sq. mile block. Each regional coordinator uses a page of the PA De Lorme Gazetteer Atlas as his region. The area around Shenango is mostly covered by pages 42 and 43 of the Atlas. Each page of the Atlas is divided into 84 blocks (though page 42 covers part of Ohio and is therefore smaller). Volunteers will be assigned to these blocks. However, everyone can help. If you would like to cover an entire block, or if you know of any unusual nesting species such as rails, bitterns, snipe, terns, hawks, owls, or the Red-headed Woodpecker, you can contact Suzanne Butcher (724-794-3534, sarbird@hotmail.com) or Linda Wagner (724-657-0867, LWagner342@aol.com), two of the many Official Atlas Volunteers. They can answer your questions, tell you how to report your observations, and direct you to the regional coordinator of your area.

New Boat For River Watchers

On May 15th, the members of the Shenango River Watchers got the opportunity to evaluate a unique new watercraft. At first glance the boat appears like most canoes one often sees on the river, but a closer examination reveals this canoe is quite different.

The “Tote ‘N Boat”, made in central Pennsylvania by Tucktech, Inc., is a solid canoe measuring 3 ft. wide x 9 ft. 6 in. long. What makes it unique is that it packs away in a tote just 4 in. x 14 in. x 48 in. and only weighs 32 pounds. So compact it easily fits in a car trunk.

It was only by a chance meeting that the Shenango River Watchers discovered the new canoe. SRW member Mike Kotyk was crossing the parking lot of the Gander Mountain store in Warren when he spotted a company representative demonstrating the Tote ‘n Boat to the store manager. Intrigued, Mike stopped, listened and began asking questions.

Mike asked, “What’s it made of?” “Polypropylene,” was the reply. Polypropylene is an extremely tough copolymer type plastic originally developed by the U.S. Aerospace Industry for its impact resistance and unique ability to bend, twist and fold thousands of times without failure. It’s currently being used in a variety of industries and has found many applications in automobiles where its properties are essential for durability, even in a wide range of temperatures.

Mike’s next question was, “How difficult is it to assemble?” The hull is removed from the tote and unfolded to a flat rectangular sheet. Then, with 8 hand tightened eyebolts and wing nuts, the basic canoe shape is achieved in a matter of a few minutes. Next the

sponsons (side flotation strips) are slipped into grooves and the side and cross rails are secured with 8 Velcro straps. In about 10 minutes, the boat was ready for the water. “Amazing!” Mike said to himself.

Next, Mike fired off a series of quick questions. “Does it meet Coast Guard requirements?” - Exceeds all USCG standards for canoes. “Capacity?” - Rated at 450 pounds, two average size adults and their gear. “Does it leak?” - Leak proof. No joints or seams. “Can you put a motor on it?” - Yes, the company offers a motor mount kit for a 2hp electric motor. And, they also offer another kit that reconfigures the front to a “Johnboat” shape.

Mike exchanged business cards with the rep and took a brochure. As he walked toward his car, his thoughts centered on his struggles getting his heavy old canoe off his roof rack and lugging it to the water.

Over the next few days Mike reviewed the website, www.tucktech.com, and corresponded with Jacque Phillips, sales VP of Tucktech. Hearing of the SRW upcoming event, Tucktech donated a new Tote ‘N Boat to the organization and Mike agreed to do a demonstration for the members.

“The Tote ‘N Boat is being discovered by a variety of outdoor enthusiasts, fishermen and hunters. RV’ers are finding them especially suited for their needs as limited storage space is a primary concern and roof racks and trailers are not usually practical. Canoe clubs are a market we’re anxious to serve and the results of the SRW event will give us a good indication of this segments viability,” Phillips stated.


